How our programs works:

As a part of Fulton County School System (FCSS), the Teaching Museum North offers curriculum-based, multidisciplinary programs and activities to enhance student learning. All programs offered during regular school hours are **free** to students currently enrolled in FCSS.

Since scheduling priority goes to FCSS teachers, we ask that all interested FCSS teachers **submit your reservation request forms as soon as possible** after the start of the school year to insure your scheduling needs are met.

Before Booking Your Performance:

Please check your school's planning calendar to prevent scheduling conflicts and adhere to any procedures or requirements set by your school.

Scheduling a program:

Reservation forms can be accessed in the FCSS's **Public Folders**. Double click the **Teaching Museum** Folder for the **North** Folder. This folder contains the TMN Program Offerings Guide for 2009/10 and the reservation form. Complete the form electronically and email it as an attachment to Tommie Ramsey at ramseyt@fultonschools.org . Be sure to include your three preferences for program dates and times. Working on a first-come-first-serve basis, Tommie will respond via email and/or telephone to finalize your request and confirm your reservation.

Please note that it is the teacher's responsibility to request buses. Please submit your request for transportation at least two weeks prior to your field trip date. Alternately, if the program will be coming to your school, please confirm a location for the performance.

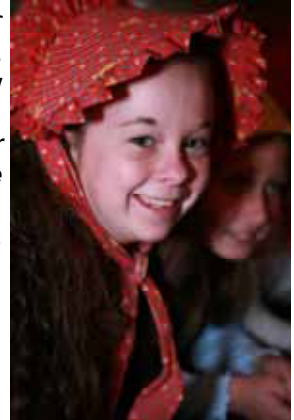
Cabin Tales

She was simply tired of the social injustice and she did not think it was right for a woman to give up her seat for a man. Her quiet strength and simple act changed the course of history.

Program: *The Weather Show*

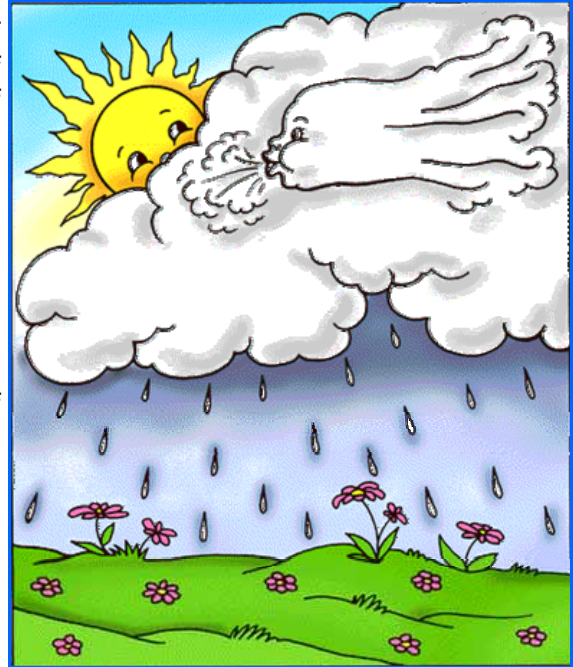
Peter and Mary Hart

Peter and Mary Ann Hart present a refreshing mix of scientific facts with the visual action and excitement of puppetry to lead young audiences into exploration of the vast topic of weather. The performance demonstrates how weather is more than something that happens in the sky that can only be explained with dry scientific facts, measuring instruments, and charts. Weather influences how we speak, what we wear, the stories we tell, and how animals behave.

The performance begins with action scenes of animals portraying "weather exaggerations" - descriptions of weather conditions commonly used in everyday conversation. The topic of "Weather Lore" is explored with fun scenes of animals engaged in curious behavior, depicting sayings that have been used through the years to forecast weather changes. Scientific explanations of air pressure, humidity, and more give reason to why animals and insects behave as they do. An American Indian myth lends a

multi-cultural look at the weather in the legend of "The Storm Bird". The subject of wind and its effects is explored in a scientific manner using the Beaufort Wind Scale, so amusing that it literally "brings down the house"! The performance concludes with a review of instructional notes on what to do in severe weather conditions and how to protect one's self in situations of extreme heat and cold.

This one-woman portrayal of Clara Barton, called by soldiers and surgeons the Angel of the Battlefield, is designed specifically for the fifth grade curriculum. With Ms. Barton dressed in her famous black silk dress, patterned after the one pictured in the famous Matthew Brady photograph, this show is performed as a lecture,

given by Ms. Barton immediately after the Civil War, about her battlefield nursing experiences. Ms. Barton was very popular on the lecture circuit after the war, conducting more lectures than Ralph Waldo Emerson and Walt Whitman. Known for her fervor when talking about "her boys" and her poignant reflections about her experiences on the front, her knowledge of Civil War medicine, her lectures moved and inspired her audiences. 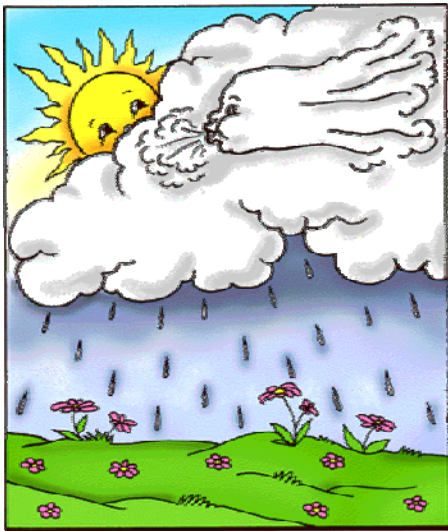

Charged with treason for making cloth for the Confederate States of America, these workers were shipped to Louisville, KY to live in refugee warehouses until work as servants, farmhands, or mill workers could be found. The one woman play is loosely based on the historical fiction juvenile novel by Patricia Beatty and portrays Hannalee Reed, a fictitious twelve year old girl, who worked as a bobbin girl in the Roswell Mill. The play documents the horrors and realities of war, particularly civil war; family devotion, love, and perseverance, that can provide strength in times that are "hilly, bumpy, and stumpy;" and it portrays the good and bad characteristics of both sides who fought in the Civil War. The play covers the nine month period from July, 1864, through April, 1865, the final months of the Civil War, and Hannalee's adventures as she turns homeward.

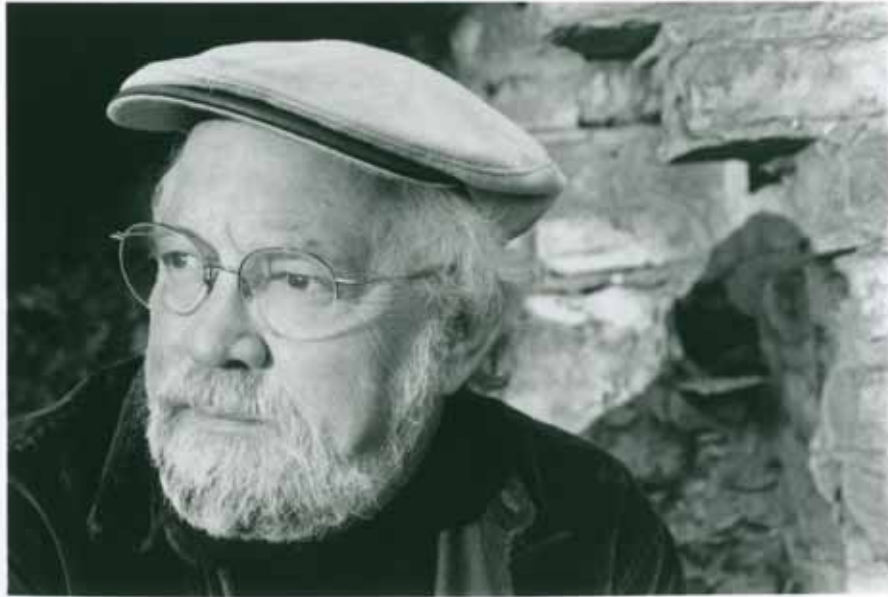
